The Economic Value of Moreno Valley College

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ORENO VALLEY COLLEGE (MVC) creates value in many ways. The college plays a key role in helping students increase their employability and achieve their individual potential. The college draws students to the region, generating new dollars and opportunities for the MVC Service Area.' MVC provides students with the education, training, and skills they need to have fulfilling and prosperous careers. Furthermore, MVC is a place for students to meet new people, increase their self-confidence, and promote their overall health and well-being.

MVC influences both the lives of its students and the regional economy. The college supports a variety of industries in the MVC Service Area, serves regional businesses, and benefits society as a whole in California from an expanded economy and improved quality of life. Additionally, the benefits created by MVC extend to the state and local government through increased tax revenues and public sector savings.

This study measures the economic impacts created by MVC on the business community and the benefits the college generates in return for the investments made by its key stakeholder groups—students, taxpayers, and society. The following two analyses are presented:

THE MVC SERVICE AREA, RIVERSIDE COUNTY, CA



MVC influences both the **lives of its students** and the **regional economy**.

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Economic impact analysis

Investment analysis

All results reflect employee, student, and financial data, provided by the college, for fiscal year (FY) 2019-20. Impacts on the MVC Service Area economy are reported under the economic impact analysis and are measured in terms of added income. The returns on investment to students, taxpayers, and society in California are reported under the investment analysis.

For the purposes of this analysis, the MVC Service Area is comprised of the following 12 ZIP codes in within Riverside County: 92508, 92518, 92551, 92552, 92553, 92554, 92555, 92556, 92557, 92570, 92571, and 92599.



MVC promotes economic growth in the MVC Service Area through its direct expenditures and the resulting expenditures of students and regional businesses. The college serves as an employer and buyer of goods and services for its dayto-day operations. The college's activities attract students from outside the MVC Service Area, whose expenditures benefit regional vendors. In addition, MVC is a primary source of higher education to the MVC Service Area residents and a supplier of trained workers to regional industries, enhancing overall productivity in the regional workforce.

Operations spending impact



MVC adds economic value to the MVC Service Area as an employer of regional residents and a large-scale buyer of goods and services. In FY 2019-20, the college employed 596 full-time and part-time faculty

and staff, 45% of whom lived in the MVC Service Area. Total payroll at MVC was \$62.3 million, much of which was spent in the region for groceries, mortgage and rent payments, dining out, and other household expenses. In addition, the college spent \$28.2 million on day-to-day expenses related to facilities, supplies, and professional services.

MVC's day-to-day operations spending added \$67.3 million in income to the region during the analysis year. This figure represents the college's payroll, the multiplier effects generated by the in-region spending of the college and its employees, and a downward adjustment to account for funding that the college received from regional sources. The \$67.3 million in added income is equivalent to supporting 650 jobs in the region.


Student spending impact



Around 43% of all students attending MVC originated from outside the region in FY 2019-20, and some of these students relocated to the MVC Service Area to attend MVC. These students may not have

come to the region if the college did not exist. In addition, some in-region students, referred to as retained students, would have left the MVC Service Area if not for the existence of MVC. While attending the college, these relocated and retained students spent money on groceries, accommodation, transportation, and other household expenses. This spending generated \$19.3 million in added income for the regional economy in FY 2019-20, which supported 417 jobs in the MVC Service Area.

Alumni impact



The education and training MVC provides for regional residents has the greatest impact. Since its establishment, students have studied at MVC and entered the regional workforce with greater knowledge

and new skills. Today, thousands of former MVC students are employed in the MVC Service Area. As a result of their education from MVC, the students receive higher earnings and increase the productivity of the businesses that employ them. In FY 2019-20, MVC alumni generated \$59.2 million in added income for the regional economy, which is equivalent to supporting 910 jobs.

Total impact

MVC added \$145.8 million in income to the MVC Service Area economy during the analysis year, equal to the sum of the operations spending impact, the student spending impact, and the alumni impact. For context, the \$145.8 million impact was equal to approximately 1.7% of the total gross regional product (GRP) of the MVC Service Area. This contribution that the college provided on its own was nearly as large as the entire Information industry in the region.

MVC's total impact can also be expressed in terms of jobs supported. The \$145.8 million impact supported 1,977 regional jobs, using the jobs-to-sales ratios specific to each industry in the region. This means that one out of every 50 jobs in the MVC Service Area is supported by the activities of MVC and its students. In addition, the \$145.8 million, or 1,977 supported jobs, stemmed from different industry sectors. Among non-education industry sectors, MVC's spending and alumni in the Accommodation & Food Services industry sector supported 331 jobs in FY 2019-20. If the college did not exist, these impacts would not have been generated in the MVC Service Area.

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INVESTMENT ANALYSIS




An investment analysis evaluates the costs associated with a proposed venture against its expected benefits. If the benefits outweigh the costs, then the investment is financially worthwhile. The analysis presented here considers MVC as an investment from the perspectives of students, taxpayers, and society in California.

Student perspective

In FY 2019-20, MVC served 17,101 students. In order to attend the college, the students paid for tuition, fees, books, and supplies. They also took out loans and will incur interest on those loans. Additionally, students gave up money they would have otherwise earned had they been working instead of attending college. The total investment made by MVC's students in FY 2019-20 amounted to a present value of \$43.4 million, equal to \$18.1 million in out-of-pocket expenses (including future principal and interest on student loans) and \$25.3 million in forgone time and money.

In return for their investment, MVC's students will receive a stream of higher future earnings that will continue to grow throughout their working lives. For example, the average MVC associate degree graduate from FY 2019-20 will see annual earnings that are \$9,500 higher than a person with a high school diploma or equivalent working in California. Over a working lifetime, the benefits of the associate degree over a high school diploma will amount to an undiscounted value of \$399 thousand in higher earnings per graduate. The present value of the cumulative higher future earnings that MVC's FY 2019-20 students will receive over their working careers is \$280.1 million.

The students' benefit-cost ratio is 6.5. In other words, for every dollar students invest in MVC in the form of out-of-pocket expenses and forgone time and money, they will receive a cumulative value of \$6.50 in higher future earnings.

STUDENTS SEE A HIGH RATE OF RETURN FOR THEIR INVESTMENT IN MVC



Annually, the students' investment in MVC has an average annual internal rate of return of 20.9%, which is impressive compared to the U.S. stock market's 30-year average rate of return of 10.6%.

Taxpayer perspective



MVC generates more in tax revenue than it takes. These benefits to taxpayers consist primarily of taxes that the state and local government will collect from the added revenue created in the state. As MVC students will earn more, they will make higher tax payments throughout

their working lives. Students' employers will also make higher tax payments as they increase their output and purchases of goods and

services. By the end of the FY 2019-20 students' working lives, the state and local government will have collected a present value of \$88.9 million in added taxes.

Benefits to taxpayers will also consist of savings generated by the improved lifestyles of MVC students and the corresponding reduced government services. Education is statistically correlated with a variety of lifestyle changes.

For every dollar of public money invested in MVC, taxpayers will receive a cumulative value of \$1.70 over the course of the students' working lives.

The educations that MVC students receive will generate savings in three main categories: 1) healthcare, 2) justice system, and 3) income assistance. Improved health will lower students' demand for national health care services. In addition, costs related to the justice system will decrease. MVC students will be more employable, so their reduced demand for income assistance such as welfare and unemployment benefits will benefit taxpayers. Altogether, the present value of the benefits associated with a MVC education will generate \$15.6 million in savings to state and local taxpayers.

Total taxpayer benefits amount to \$104.5 million, the present value sum of the added taxes and public sector savings. Taxpayer costs are \$62.8 million, equal to the amount of state and local government funding MVC received in FY 2019-20. These benefits and costs yield a benefit-cost ratio of 1.7. This means that for every dollar of public money invested in MVC in FY 2019-20, taxpayers will receive a cumulative present value of \$1.70 over the course of the students' working lives. The average annual internal rate of return for taxpayers is 3.1%, which compares favorably to other long-term investments in the public and private sectors.

Social perspective



Society as a whole in California benefits from the presence of MVC in two major ways. Primarily, society benefits from an increased economic base in the state. This is attributed to the added income

from students' increased lifetime earnings (added student income) and increased business output (added business income), which raise economic prosperity in California.

Benefits to society also consist of the savings generated by the improved lifestyles of MVC students. As discussed in the previous section, education is statistically correlated with a variety of lifestyle changes that generate social savings. Note that these costs are avoided by the consumers but are distinct from the costs avoided by the taxpayers outlined above. Healthcare savings include avoided medical costs associated with smoking, alcohol dependence, obesity, drug abuse, and depression. Justice system savings include avoided costs to the government and society due to less judicial activity. Income assistance savings include reduced welfare and unemployment claims. 
Altogether, the social benefits of MVC equal a present value of \$1.2 billion. These benefits include \$945.6 million in added student income, \$245.8 million in added business income, \$31.6 million in added income from college activities, as well as \$22.3 million in social savings related to health, crime, and income assistance in California. People in California invested a present value total of \$130.4 million in MVC in FY 2019-20. The cost includes all the college and student costs.

The benefit-cost ratio for society is 9.5, equal to the \$1.2 billion in benefits divided by the \$130.4 million in costs. In other words, for every dollar invested in MVC, people in California will receive a cumulative value of \$9.50 in benefits. The benefits of this investment will occur for as long as MVC's FY 2019-20 students remain employed in the state workforce.

Summary of investment analysis results

The results of the analysis demonstrate that MVC is a strong investment for all three major stakeholder groups—students, taxpayers, and society. As shown, students receive a great return for their investments in a MVC education. At the same time, taxpayers' investment in MVC returns more to government budgets than it costs and creates a wide range of social benefits throughout California.

CONCLUSION

The results of this study demonstrate that MVC creates value from multiple perspectives. The college benefits regional businesses by increasing consumer spending in the region and supplying a steady flow of qualified, trained workers to the workforce. MVC enriches the lives of students by raising their lifetime earnings and helping them achieve their individual potential. The college benefits state and local taxpayers through increased tax receipts and a reduced demand for government-supported social services. Finally, MVC benefits society as a whole in California by creating a more prosperous economy and generating a variety of savings through the improved lifestyles of students.

About the study

Data and assumptions used in the study are based on several sources, including the FY 2019-20 academic and financial reports from MVC, industry and employment data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and U.S. Census Bureau, outputs of Emsi Burning Glass's Multi-Regional Social Accounting Matrix model, and a variety of studies and surveys relating education to social behavior. The study applies a conservative methodology and follows standard practice using only the most recognized indicators of economic impact and investment effectiveness.
