Item 1. Program Goals and Objectives

This degree is designed to facilitate the student's passage from Riverside City College to the California State University (CSU) System with an Associate in Arts in Social Justice Studies – Asian American Studies. This degree will satisfy the lower division requirements for the eventual conferral of the Bachelor's Degree in Ethnic Studies, Asian American Studies, and Asian American and Pacific Islander Studies at a CSU. With this degree the student will be prepared for transfer to the university upper division level. Additionally, the intent of an associate degree for transfer is to assist students in seamlessly transferring to a CSU.

Item 2. Catalog Description

The Associate in Arts for Transfer in Social Justice Studies – Asian American Studies is designed to provide a clear pathway to a CSU major and baccalaureate programs in Social Justice or Ethnic Studies, or to programs focused in Asian American Studies. Asian American critically examines the history, issues, sociology, religion, experiences, culture, and policies relevant to Asian Americans. Students will study Asian American experiences from various groups, focusing on race, ethnicity, and the complex relations and phenomena of culture, power, oppression, equity, and equality. California Community College students who are awarded an ADT are guaranteed admission with junior standing somewhere in the CSU system. This priority does not guarantee admission to specific majors or campuses.

Students will have to fulfill the following requirements to earn this degree:

- (1) Complete 60 semester units that are eligible for transfer to the California State University, including both of the following:
 - (A) The Inter-segmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) or the California State University General Education-Breadth requirement;
 - (B) A minimum of 18 semester units as required for the Associate in Arts for Transfer in Social Justice Studies Ethnic Studies major.
- (2) Obtain an overall minimum grade point average of 2.0
- (3) Earn a grade of C or better in all courses required for the Associate in Arts for Transfer in Social Justice Studies Ethnic Studies major.

Study the basic concepts of figure, ground, line, contrast, pattern, proportion, color, symmetry, movement, unity, and balance. Students learn the principles of two- and three-dimensional design and develop language to analyze product design, plate presentations, decoration, and packaging on visual, tactile, and conceptual levels. Students will understand and use contemporary flavor pairing concepts.
- Students course will focus on chocolate and confectionery technology, ingredient function, and the production of chocolates and confections in an artisan setting. Vital concepts in both theory and practice will include controlling the crystallization of fats and sugars, manipulating water and free water in centers, and understanding the mechanics of emulsions. Students will apply their knowledge of these concepts in daily production of a wide range of chocolates and confections. Types of centers to be discussed and produced include varieties of ganache, crystalline and noncrystalline sugar confections, nut-based centers, jellies, and aerated confections. Ingredient function will focus on fats, nutritive sweeteners, dairy products, binding agents, and chocolate. Techniques include chocolate tempering methods, sugar cooking technique, hand dipping centers, and shell molding.
- Students will understand and demonstrate how to make and use pastillage, marzipan, nougatine, and prepare and use spun sugar, sugar centerpieces, and caramel decorations. Students will demonstrate critical safely measures when working with sugar, identify ingredients and equipment used for décor work, demonstrate proper techniques for pulling sugar for storage and future use, demonstrate the proper technique for handling kroquant and apply concepts on design to create a finished decorative centerpiece for display.

The Anesthesia Technology program is sequential didactic and clinical curriculum that prepares the student to be an integral member of the perioperative surgical and anesthesia patient care team. Emphasis is on fundamental and advanced didactic theories and clinical experiences that enable the student to assist anesthesia care providers in the perioperative delivery of anesthesia care to a variety of surgical patients. This experience will occur in a variety of clinical settings including: in-patient surgery, interventional and diagnostic radiology, post anesthesia care unit, intensive care unit, cardiac catheterization lab, emergency room, endoscopy suite, dental suites, and ambulatory surgery centers.

Student responsibilities include experience with hemodynamic monitoring and anesthesia equipment in the following areas: cleaning, sterilizing, assembling, calibrating, testing, troubleshooting, and recording of inspections and maintenance. Students will assist anesthesia providers with perioperative patient care including preoperative assessment, application of hemodynamic monitoring modalities, induction, airway management, patient positioning, maintenance, and emergence of anesthesia. Students will assist in post operative care of surgical patients in the post anesthesia care units. Students will gain experience in the insertion of peripheral IV's, and assist the anesthesia care provider in the preparation, insertion, and maintenance of invasive lines.

This program prepares students to become a Certified Anesthesia Technologist in the preparation necessary to become an integral member of the anesthesia patient care team. The program emphasizes the fundamental and advanced clinical procedures to assist licensed anesthesia providers in the acquisition, preparation, and application of various equipment required for the delivery of anesthesia care.

Prerequisites: None.

- 5. Conduct a comprehensive, appropriate equipment check, identifies and takes appropriate action when confronted with anesthetic equipment-related malfunctions and maintains.



- 6. Use critical thinking skills in assisting the anesthesia provider with patients of all types, ages and physical conditions for a variety of surgical and medically related procedures.
- 7. Set up, and calibrate non-invasive and invasive monitoring equipment, and understands data obtained from these modalities.
- 8. In collaboration with the anesthesia provider recognize and appropriately respond to anesthetic complications that occur during the perioperative period.

Study the basic concepts of figure, ground, line, contrast, pattern, proportion, color, symmetry, movement, unity, and balance. Students learn the principles of two- and three-dimensional design and develop language to analyze product design, plate presentations, decoration, and packaging on visual, tactile, and conceptual levels. Students will understand and use contemporary flavor pairing concepts.
- Students course will focus on chocolate and confectionery technology, ingredient function, and the production of chocolates and confections in an artisan setting. Vital concepts in both theory and practice will include controlling the crystallization of fats and sugars, manipulating water and free water in centers, and understanding the mechanics of emulsions. Students will apply their knowledge of these concepts in daily production of a wide range of chocolates and confections. Types of centers to be discussed and produced include varieties of ganache, crystalline and noncrystalline sugar confections, nut-based centers, jellies, and aerated confections. Ingredient function will focus on fats, nutritive sweeteners, dairy products, binding agents, and chocolate. Techniques include chocolate tempering methods, sugar cooking technique, hand dipping centers, and shell molding.
- Students will understand and demonstrate how to make and use pastillage, marzipan, nougatine, and prepare and use spun sugar, sugar centerpieces, and caramel decorations. Students will demonstrate critical safely measures when working with sugar, identify ingredients and equipment used for décor work, demonstrate proper techniques for pulling sugar for storage and future use, demonstrate the proper technique for handling kroquant and apply concepts on design to create a finished decorative centerpiece for display.

This degree is designed to facilitate the student's passage from Riverside City College to the California State University (CSU) System with an Associate in Arts in English for Transfer degree. This degree will satisfy the lower division requirements for the eventual conferral of the Bachelor's Degree in English at a CSU. The Associate in Arts in English for Transfer degree is a curricular pattern designed specifically to transfer students as English majors with junior status to the CSU system and provides broad general preparation for English majors entering any four-year university. Additionally, the intent of an associate degree for transfer is to assist students in seamlessly transferring to a CSU.

Item 2. Catalog Description

The Associate in Arts in English for Transfer degree is a curricular pattern designed specifically to transfer students as English majors with junior status to the CSU system. Though the Associate in Arts in English for Transfer also provides broad general preparation for English majors entering any four-year university, students must consult the specific requirements of any non-CSU campus to which they are applying. Students earning the Associate in Arts in English for Transfer will analyze, interpret, and synthesize diverse texts in order to construct well-supported academic arguments and literary analyses, and they will encounter interpretive questions to which there are multiple plausible answers. Students earning this degree will also have exposure to a variety of literary genres and periods and will be able to illustrate a basic understanding of the ways that literature can embody cultural, intellectual, and artistic trends.

This degree will satisfy the lower division requirements for the eventual conferral of the Bachelor's Degree in Social Justice Studies – Gender Studies at a CSU. With this degree the student will be prepared for transfer to the university upper division level. Additionally, the intent of an associate degree for transfer is to assist students in seamlessly transferring to a CSU.

Related fields include Women and Gender Studies, Feminist Studies, Sexuality Studies, Ethnic Studies, Critical Race Studies, or any of a number of other CSU majors in this "area of emphasis." According to the Employment Development Department (EDD) Labor Market Information Division, Public Safety Dispatchers occupational group is expected to increase by 9% through 2023; 88 annual openings will be available in the Inland Empire/Desert Region.

The Public Safety Dispatch Certificate will be run in conjunction with our partner, The Riverside County Sheriff's Department. We currently have a locally approved certificate for the Public Safety Dispatch Course (ADJ D1A) and are requesting a state certificate with the indicated courses noted in section 3. As indicated by the labor market information, there is a definite need for our certificate program.

- Licensed practical and licensed vocational nurse jobs are expected to increase by 11% between 2017 and 2022 in the Inland Empire/Desert Region. A total of 3,679 job openings will be available over the five-year timeframe.
- The entry-level wage for licensed practical and licensed vocational nurses is **above the MIT Living Wage estimate of \$12.30 per hour** for a single adult living in the Inland
 Empire/Desert Region.
- Occupational demand appears to be met by educational supply based on the average annual number of program completers for the selected community college program (164 community college credentials, 552 other educational institution credentials, 716 annual average total), and the annual openings for licensed practical and licensed vocational nurses in the region (736 annual job openings). Facilities

The college has the facilities and resources to maintain the courses at the level of quality described in this proposal. All courses are already active and offered on a regular basis at Riverside City College

Program Costs.

- 1. Students pay Health Services (\$25), parking (\$150), Student Services Fees (\$30) and tuition (\$46) per unit each semester. The cost is approximately \$2,000.00 for 12 months.
- 2. Students furnish their own uniforms. The cost is approximately \$250.
- 3. The costs of supply bag, iPad, testing platform and other required supplies are approximately \$600 for a year.
- 4. Physical examination/lab work costs are approximately \$98 \$600.
- 5. Background checks/CPR costs approximately \$220.
- 6. It is recommended that students carry personal health and accident insurance including hospitalization. Policies are available to college students at reasonable rates. The college provides liability insurance at no cost to the student.
- 7. Students are required to purchase ATI PN Supreme package (digital textbooks, skills modules, video case studies, standardized assessments, web-based tutorials, NCLEX-PN preparation, case studies, and remediation resources) for use during the program. Estimated cost is \$1,650.00.
